

Frequently Asked Questions about In-Person Meetings & Troop Trips/Activities for Volunteers

Thank you for reviewing the returning to In-Person Troop Meetings - Interim COVID-19 Guidance for volunteers that went into effect on **September 20th, 2021**. Below you will find answers to some of the questions you may have.

Who is making the decisions for Girl Scouts of Greater New York regarding restrictions due to Covid-19?

In February 2020, a Girl Scouts of Greater New York Response Team was formed with executive leadership staff members from several areas of the council. The team was assigned to review and monitor the health crisis to determine what would be necessary to ensure the health and safety of the membership including girls, volunteers, and staff. The Girl Scouts of Greater New York Response Team reviewed recommendations from many sources including local and state health departments, CDC and American Camp Association to develop and update GSGNY Guidelines as needed. We will continue to do so in the coming months.

How was the Outdoor Troop Meeting group size determined?

It was determined that smaller group sizes ensure that all safety measures including wearing a mask and social distancing can be monitored and guaranteed by the adults present.

Why are we unable to meet in the backyard?

GSUSA strongly suggests no meetings in the home out of concern that there would be a greater risk of exposure to other family members. GSGNY determined bringing people to a backyard or front yard would present the same concern. **However, if your home was approved as a troop meeting location prior to January 2019, you are eligible to host troop meetings at home with the caregiver's consent. If your home was not approved or visited by a council staff member for evaluation, home troop meetings are not allowed. Any questions contact customer care@girlscoutsnyc.org**

Can adult groups meet if they follow the same guidelines?

Yes, adults and leaders can meet in person following the same guidelines as the troop meetings. These guidelines were developed to allow girls to engage with their troop mates and adult leaders.

When can we hold Girl Scouts troop meetings?

If you and your leaders decide to meet in-person, outdoor and indoor meeting spaces that provide enough space to maintain social distancing can be permitted for meetings. Please receive permission from the property owner or the jurisdiction that provides the location. Meeting in private backyards is prohibited. Troops and Service Units should maintain an [Attendee Log](#) for all Girl Scouts meetings and activities.

When can we take a trip or attend an event?

Can a troop be the color guard at a ceremony and/or parade?

At GSGNY, we feel it is important to continue the important annual traditions within your community when it is safe to do so. Outdoor ceremonies are acceptable for a troop to act as a color guard at an outdoor ceremony if the following conditions are in place:

- Troop(s) must be 6 feet from all members of the ceremony wearing masks.

Can we have an instructor or speaker attend our Indoor or Outdoor Troop Meeting to work with the girls?

Yes, an adult instructor or speaker such as a Yoga Instructor, Art or Dance Teacher or maybe a Naturalist may attend to work with the girls at the meeting. They can be considered as the third adult so not to exceed the permitted group size. The instructor/speaker should be sent the same Outdoor Troop Meeting Requirements information and review the COVID-19 Health Screening questions before participating.

I can't wait to take my troop on a trip. Where can my troop go?

Girl Scouts of Greater New York troops should follow troop trip guidelines.

What is the Girl Scout Adult-to-Girl Safety Ratio?

Girl Scouts' adult-to-girl ratios are the minimum number of background-cleared and registered adults needed to supervise a specific number of girls.

Do I have to observe social distancing practices?

Any troop meeting/trips/activity must follow NYC, NYS, and CDC guidelines. All girls and volunteers must practice social distancing, wear face coverings (masks) and follow safety guidelines as outlined by the CDC. It's important to regularly check and follow real-time local and national safety directives.

Should I ask the troop caregivers before planning a trip with the troop?

It's important to survey families for their comfort level with respect to returning to in-person gatherings.

Can troop leaders transport their Girl Scouts to the trip/activity location?

We ask caregivers to transport their Girl Scouts to and from the trip/activity location.

What type of training do I need to take my troops on a trip in New York City?

Girl Scouts of Greater New York troop leaders should have completed the GSGNY Leader's Guide to Success training. It's recommended that all troops have a registered and background cleared person who is certified in First Aid/CPR accompany them on trips. If you have any questions, contact the council.

My troop has decided that they are comfortable going to a restaurant. Is this allowed?

This would be considered a troop trip. Any troop trip/activity must follow NYC, NYS and CDC guidelines, as well as the establishment's guidelines.

Can my troop go camping at any camp?

Can my troop go horseback riding within New York City?

Troops can go horseback riding. Review the [Safety Activity Checkpoints](#) about horseback riding with the Girl Scouts and the caregivers. The stable operator should be able to provide evidence of \$1 million liability insurance and instructor certifications upon request. Additional insurance should be purchased for all participants.

What do I need to prepare my troop for my trip?

Each caregiver must complete and submit the following forms:

- [Girl Scouts of Greater New York Health and Safety Record](#) to troop leaders prior to the trip/activity.
- [Check Safety Activity Checkpoints for planned activity.](#)
- Caregiver Permission for Troop Trip/Activity
- [Attendee Screening Log](#)
- First aid kit, including masks, hand sanitizer, and disinfect wipes.
- Complete a [GSGNY Troop Trip & Insurance Application Form](#) Review the FAQ of when additional insurance is required.

Can we take “tagalongs” on our trip?

Yes, but tagalongs cannot be cared for by those who are supervising Girl Scouts.

What is a “tagalong”?

A tagalong is anyone who is in attendance at a Girl Scout activity who is not a registered member of the Girl Scouts of Greater New York.

Do I need to purchase additional insurance for my trip?

If there is anyone going on the trip who is not registered with Girl Scouts, additional insurance must be purchased. All adults who are supervising Girl Scouts must be registered and background cleared.

Can our troop request Subway Passes?

We are not currently able to process any Group Subway Pass applications.
